Patrick Andrews noted that the minutes mentioned our "regular" plant auction, and he would like the minutes to reflect the people who donated plants rather than have members "expect" plants for auction and take the generosity of the donors for granted.

INSTALLATION OF OFFICERS

Irma Velez, outgoing President, presided over the installation of officers and directors who were elected at the March meeting.

After the swearing in ceremony, Patrick Andrews, the new President, conducted the rest of the meeting. He expressed his appreciation for members' support.

Patrick outlined the traditional succession of officers from Second Vice President/Program Chairman, to First Vice President/Show Chairman, and then to President. While this order is not part of the GCS Bylaws, it has been found useful to have officers with prior experience in the line of succession.

Patrick noted that the GCS Bylaws are on the websites of both the Atlantic Coast Camellia Society and the American Camellia Society.

The Atlantic Coast Camellia Society has asked Patrick whether the GCS is willing to place copies of our newsletter on their website. He will direct the newsletter Editor to send a copy each month.

OLD BUSINESS

Bill Hayes reported on his investigation into purchasing replacement banners for GCS show/display tables. The only local provider that Bill found was Signs by Tomorrow.

The signs are polyester with printed (probably silk screened) logos. The runners are available in several colors. The cost for a 30 inch by 84 inch table runner was \$143.33 plus tax. The cost

for a 30 inch by 62³/₄inch runner is \$113.33 plus tax.

After discussion, Jerry Hogsette moved that GCS purchase one of the larger banners, a black runner with red camellia and green leaves and white lettering. If the first runner is suitable, GCS would then consider purchasing additional runners. The motion was seconded by Bob Weidman and approved.

NEW BUSINESS

Gene Dunn moved that GCS contribute \$500 to the American Camellia Society Endowment Fund. The motion was seconded by Jeanne Ernest and after discussion, the motion was approved.

Irma Velez moved that GCS contribute \$500 to Kanapaha Gardens to be used toward maintenance of the Azalea and Camellia Gardens. The motion was seconded by Jerry Hogsette and after discussion, the motion was approved.

A question was raised as to whether GCS knows what our contract with Kanapaha Gardens will be for the upcoming year. Irma stated that the contract is usually sent out after the end of Kanapaha's fiscal year, and we should receive it sometime in July.

A question was also raised as to whether any perks (such as parking passes for the Annual GCS Show and Spring Festival) could be negotiated into the contract. It was suggested that we have Alexis from Kanapaha as a guest speaker at one of our meetings. Irma will look into that possibility.

Irma and Mike McCafferty from Kanapaha plan to go through the

Camellia and Azalea Garden to decide where Species and understory plants should be planted. Shade-loving bulbs will also be planted in the garden.

Patrick Andrews asked for a list of available Species plants. He and Bob Weidman have worked with Species for a while and may be able to offer some opinions on the success factor of some of these.

ANNOUNCEMENTS

Throughout the meeting, pictures from the 2013 GCS Camellia Show were displayed on a computer projector.

The ACS business meeting will be held in June 2013.

The ACS Annual Convention will be held December 11-15, 2013, in Pensacola, Florida. Hotel reservations at the Hampton Inn can be made now, and those wanting to attend were encouraged to make reservations soon.

The ACCS Annual Meeting will be in September in Litchfield Beach, South Carolina.

The 2014 ACS meeting will be held in Tallahassee.

Camellia plants donated by Jerry Hogsette, Patrick Andrews, and Bob Weidman were auctioned for members. The meeting adjourned.

This variety is very old, but is worth having in the garden because of its early blooming period. The gibbed buds on other varieties are opening now as well. This week we had a beautiful *Brooke* and the just-as-gorgeous *Satsuma kurenai*.

Some of our members will be going to the first camellia show of the season in Perry GA in October. The first one I'll be able to attend is the show in Byron GA in November. Patrick also thanked Anna Langford for the good job on the GCS newsletter.

APPROVAL OF MAY MEETING MINUTES

The May meeting minutes were available to members in the September Newsletter. No additions or corrections were noted. Bill Hayes moved to approve the minutes of the May meeting; seconded by Jerry Hogsette and approved.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Merry Reid advised that the changeover of all financials is complete. She and Nancy closed out all the old accounts and opened new accounts due to the purchase of Wachovia by Wells Fargo. The account arrangements with Wachovia were grandfathered in by Wells Fargo.

Patrick asked Merry if she had received the contract from Kanapaha Botanical Gardens for the upcoming year. She has not, and Nancy Collins noted she usually did not receive a contract until the end of the year. Nancy has sent the change of contact/address information to Kanapaha. Irma Velez noted in the July Board meeting that Kanapaha's charges would be the same as last year.

Bill Hayes agreed to audit the books for the past fiscal year, and Nancy Collins turned the records over to him. He will complete the audit before the October meeting.

ANNOUNCEMENTS

The American Camellia Society membership drive has begun, and first time members are being offered half off the regular membership price. This discount is good through December, and Patrick has copies of the discount order forms.

The Atlantic Coast Camellia Society meeting will be held next weekend in Litchfield, SC. John and Dinh Swanson plan to attend and are the new historians of the ACCS.

The Gulf Coast Camellia Society meeting will be held in early October.

The ACS 2014 calendar is now available on the ACS website for pre-order. The cost is \$12.95 and ACS members receive a 10% discount.

Patrick has created a New Member Reward card that will be given to new members at their first GCS meeting, along with a free camellia plant. The Reward Card, valid for a year, entitles a new member to a second free camellia plant once they have attended two additional meetings. Reward plants will be provided by Bob Weidman and Patrick. He gave Reward Cards to today's new member attendees

Ruth Milton is at home recovering from her accident. She is using a wheelchair and hopes she will be able to attend the October meeting.

OLD BUSINESS

Patrick gave an overview of the July 6, 2013, GCS Board meeting.

He then reviewed the duties of each officer.

<u>STANDING COMMITTEES</u> THE FINANCE COMMITTEE

is headed by the Treasurer and is responsible for audit of the books each year. A question was raised as to how the GCS is listed under IRS regulations. That discussion is described under New Business. GCS does not file returns with the IRS.

THE MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE is

responsible for recruiting new members for GCS and for promoting membership in the American Camellia Society. Karen Peeples accepted the chairmanship with Patrick Andrews and Merry Reid serving as committee members. The Board agreed to have the Membership Committee create a New Member Rewards Card (previously described in Announcements.

THE SOCIAL COMMITTEE is chaired by Dolly Warner.

<u>SPECIAL COMMITTEES</u>

THE KANAPAHA GARDENS COMMITTEE handles oversight of the Camellia and Azalea garden. Irma Velez will be in charge of this committee.

THE KANAPAHA SPRING FESTIVAL COMMITTEE will be headed by Jerry Hogsette. Bill Hayes said he has ordered the GCS banner for our Spring Festival show table, and it should be ready by next week. Although the banner company could not use the camellia graphic we provided, they found a graphic which Bill felt would be more than acceptable.

THE GCS CAMELLIA SHOW

COMMITTEE is chaired by John Swanson, who has begun preparation for the 2014 show.

Patrick Andrews presented the updated show flyer. Entry times have been adjusted to allow sufficient time for judging and to avoid the delays experienced at the 2013 show. Several other changes have been made in the logistics to facilitate judging.

Show committee chairmen include:

<u>Horticulture Schedule</u> – Chuck Ritter and Patrick Andrews

<u>Head Table and Honor Court</u> – Jerry Hogsette and Patrick Andrews

<u>Horticulture Judges</u> – Jerry Hogsette, who said that he has sent out digital letters to judges, and he has already received acceptances. Eileen Hart will be the head judge.

<u>Hospitality Hosts</u> – Paul and Dolly Warner

<u>Plant Procurement</u> – Bill Luecking, who has lists of plants available for pre-order by members. He will order plants by the end of the week.

Flower Arrangements – Lee Kline

Awards – Patrick Andrews

Several areas still need staffing, and volunteers should see John Swanson to sign up.

Bill Leucking reviewed information obtained regarding non-profit status for GCS. He has been investigating the possibility of GCS filing as a non-profit. Filing fees would be approximately \$130, and if we retain an attorney to handle the filing, the cost could go as high as \$400. Bill noted that a lawsuit was filed recently against the entire membership of an archery club in Vero Beach because of an accident that occurred during a show hosted by the club, and all 111 members of the club were sued individually to the tune of \$42,000 per member. Because the club did not have non-profit status, all members of the organization were equally liable.

Discussion followed on the potential for non-profit status and protection during any of GCS public functions. John Swanson will check on "event coverage" insurance and our liability vis à vis Kanapaha's insurance for public events, possibly including GCS as an additional named insured. Bill will continue his investigation into non-profit status and report back to members.

NEW BUSINESS

Debbie Griffin moved that GCS purchase ten copies of the 2014 Nomenclature books for purchase by members. This book contains everything registered up through two months ago and is usually updated every five years. It also includes a list of camellia size changes that have been made. The cost is \$20 per book, with GCS receiving a 25% discount. After some discussion,

members asked that the number of books to be ordered be increased. Mrs. Griffin amended her motion to order 15 books; seconded and approved. Merry Reid will place the order.

Bill Leucking has been approached by Growers Fertilizer Company about setting up an account offering a 10% discount to GCS members. Their representative is willing to come to a meeting to talk about their company and products. Bill will follow through with Grower Fertilizer to set up this account.

Mr. Perez presented a slide show depicting the walking pilgrimage he undertook in Spain recently, The Way of St. James to Camino de Santiago.

President's Message

November is a great month for camellias! Sasanquas have been blooming for weeks now, giving great splashes of color. The nice thing about sasanquas is that the flowers open all at once so that the shrub is covered with brilliant flowers. Also opening in November are the early japonicas, *like Early Woodville Red, Early Autumn, Alba Plena, Brooke, Arajishi, Kiku Toji*, and others.

If you started gibbing flowers in September (or earlier), you will be rewarded with many other camellia flowers this month. Some varieties that I noticed opening shortly after being gibbed are *Blue Ridge Sunset* (registered by Clarence and Lillian Gordy of Ocala), *Satsuma Kurenai* (a gorgeous formal double red), *Mary Fisher* (a show winner that reliably opens early when gibbed), *Henry Huntington*, and many others.

November is a month to reflect on all that we are grateful for. I am grateful for the many friends I have made in the camellia world, and the prospect that I will make many more in the years to come. I am thankful for the generosity of camellia growers in helping me expand my garden with varieties that I otherwise would not have access to. I am perhaps most grateful for the friendship and camaraderie.

Show season kicked off in October. To date, five shows have already taken place. I have not been able to attend any due to work conflicts, but members Chuck and Bev Ritter have done quite well so far. The show results for all shows are available on the ACCS website (<u>www.atlanticcoastcamelliasociety.org</u>) and the ACS website (<u>www.americancamellias.org</u>). Of special note is that Chuck and Bev Ritter won the coveted "Best Georgia National Fair Bloom" at the Perry, Georgia, show. This is no easy feat! Coming up soon are shows in Valdosta, Georgia, on December 7, and the American Camellia Society Convention (December 11-15) and National Camellia Show (December 14th) in Pensacola, Florida. The GCS Show Committee will have met before the upcoming November meeting, and John Swanson will give a report at the meeting. Excitement is building for the show, and all members are urged to participate in some way, particularly with set-up, tear-down, flower placement, clerking, and sponsoring prizes to help offset the cost.

APPROVAL OF SEPTEMBER MEETING MINUTES

A question was raised regarding the New Member Rewards Camellia, and Karen Peeples clarified that the Rewards Camellia will be donated by Patrick Andrews and Bob Weidman. GCS is responsible for presentation of a free camellia plant when a new member attends their first meeting.

Merry Reid corrected the item under New Business regarding the purchase of Nomenclature books from ACS. Buyers will receive a 10% discount, not 25%.

The Nomenclature books have been received and are available for purchase.

Merry also has a new supply of the metal plant tags available for purchase.

OLD BUSINESS

GCS Workdays at Kanapaha Camellia/Azalea Garden:

Irma Velez said the garden is looking the best it has in eight years. Work needs to be done on disbudding and gibbing to insure the best blooms in time for the show. She would like to see more GCS members involved. Send Irma an email at <u>idvelez@directv.net</u> if you are able to help out. John thanked Irma for the relationship that she has built with Kanapaha Gardens and her willingness to work with Kanapaha on our behalf.

Our new GCS banner was displayed at the head table. Members gave Bill Hayes a round of applause for his efforts in procuring the new banner.

2014 Camellia Show Update:

John confirmed that Kanapaha will open the doors at 6:00 am to allow access by exhibitors. Irma will be in charge. Volunteers for flower placement should arrive early.

Irma also agreed to do her Camellia 101 presentation on Saturday and Sunday for the public.

Chuck Ritter suggested that we use our regular meeting room after the flower staging is completed as the "Contention Room", so that final judging can take place there. That would make the larger room available earlier for visitors rather than making them wait until after the final judging.

Bill Hayes is recruiting volunteers for clerking duties and circulated a sign-up sheet. He would like three clerks for each group of judges.

Bill Luecking has some non-member volunteers to assist with plant sales, but he could use two or three more volunteers to work on Saturday. He confirmed that the nurseries will deliver plants and he will house them until the show. Should a delivery problem arise, he will pick up the plants. Plant sales will begin at 9:00 am Saturday.

Lee Kline confirmed that the Gainesville Garden Club will provide four flower arrangements for display.

Karen Peeples advised that publicity notices were sent out, and we already have confirmation from GRU that they will announce our show in their December newsletter and on their website.

Set up will begin at 2:00 pm on the Friday before the show, and volunteers are

welcome. The Working Dinner will be held at Jerry Hogsette's home that evening.

Dolly and Paul Warner are in charge of hospitality.

NEW BUSINESS

John asked for discussion regarding the GCS meeting in December. The American Camellia Society annual meeting in Pensacola runs from December 11th through the 14th, with attendees traveling back on December 15th, our usual meeting date.

John suggested that we change the meeting to December 22nd at another location. Bill Luecking said that Wilmot Gardens is available that weekend, and Linda Luecking confirmed that we could have our meeting there. There would be no charge for use of the room, and the camellia gardens will be in bloom. Irma Velez moved that we change the December GCS meeting to December 22nd at Wilmot Gardens. Motion seconded by Lee Kline and approved. Final details would be worked out at the November meeting.

Bill noted that there are approximately two dozen plants in Wilmot Gardens that have not yet been identified, and Linda has asked that members who attend the Christmas social walk through the garden and help identify these plants if possible.

John advised that Patrick Andrews and Bob Weidman are not certain whether they will be able to have their annual Camellia Open House on our regular meeting date in January, and there is a conflict with Kanapaha for the third Sunday in January. Details for the January meeting should be finalized by our November meeting.

There is another conflict with the March 2014 GCS meeting due to Kanapaha's Spring Garden Festival, and we will have to move the GCS meeting to March 9, 2014.

It was suggested that a calendar of future meetings be included in the newsletter.

It was also suggested that after the summer Board meeting we have a Board member get together with Kanapaha to confirm meeting reservations for the upcoming year.

Chuck Ritter brought a tray displaying several varieties of camellia blossoms from his garden.

Dudley Farms will have their annual Cane Grinding Day on Saturday, December 7th, and camellia plants air layered from plants on the farm would be available for sale.

The Gainesville Garden Club will have their flower show in the Tower Club Ballroom at The Village on November 8th and 9th and everyone is invited.

PROGRAM

Due to a potential storm alert today, our speaker did not want to be outside with her equipment in case of inclement weather. This speaker has been rescheduled for April 2014.

John thanked Merry Reid, who provided refreshments for today's meeting, and Ruth Milton, who provided drinks. Meeting adjourned at 2:55 pm

2014 CAMELLIA SHOW

Bill Leucking has ordered 540 plants for the show; 78 were pre-sale. If we do not sell all the plants, a local nursery will purchase up to 125 plants at cost plus a portion of the shipping.

Over 30 publicity notices were e-mailed to local newspapers, radio and TV stations, local tourist websites and community magazines.

John Swanson advised that display tables will arrive between 9 am and 1 pm on Friday, January 3rd. Volunteers are needed starting at 2 pm to help with setup, displays, and filling flower display cups. Patrick Andrews has donated the signage for the display tables.

On Sunday afternoon, the tear-down time will depend on how many people are still viewing the blooms. Volunteers are asked to be at the show by 3 pm.

Minutes for GCS Meeting - December 22, 2013

<u>I</u>NTRODUCTION

Patrick gave an overview of the ACS meeting that just finished up in Pensacola. There were educational seminars and visits to local camellia gardens, including the gardens at the University of West Florida.

Patrick called for a round of applause for Linda Leucking for the magnificent work she has done with Wilmot Gardens: "The Champion of the Garden", Linda Leucking.

APPROVAL OF NOVEMBER MEETING MINUTES

Patrick Andrews noted that no mention was made of the November program, "Landscaping with Camellias," which he presented, and that the camellia auction plants in November were provided by Patrick Andrews, Jerry Hogsette and Bob Weidman.



	MONTHLY CARE OF CAMELLIAS (This month's reprinted article)
January Continue gibbing. Pick up and destroy all dead blooms. Put them into trash bags at then into your trash container. DO NOT put dead blooms into your compost pile. It to control interior growth and plant height after the plant has quit blooming and be new growth begins. Check the soil pH and add necessary chemicals to keep the pH the 6.0-7.0 range. Sulfur will lower the pH (make it more acidic) and dolomitic line raise it (make it more alkaline).	
February	This month is a good time to begin grafting and air-layering. Continue picking up and disposing of dead blooms.
March	A prime time for grafting, air-layering, and pruning plants that have stopped blooming.
April	Fertilize with 16-4-8. For a large plant (6 ft or taller), sprinkle one cup of fertilizer at the drip line. Water in the fertilizer after applying. If scale or insect problems are observed, spray plants with dormant oil (e.g., Volck).
May	Now and through the summer, water whenever two weeks pass without rain. Mulch plants with pine straw 2-4 inches deep. If you want to root cuttings, May through August is the best time to do it.
June	Follow May instructions if you have not already completed those tasks.
July	Fertilize again with 16-4-8, or use Azalea-Camellia fertilizer, 4-8-12, and water it in. It's now too late to prune, or you will cut off bloom buds for the coming season. Check air-layers. If they are damaged and moss is dry, spray with water and re-wrap.
August	Water during long dry spells. Ground should be moist, not wet! A reliable indicator is: when your azalea leaves begin to droop, you need to water.
September	Begin gibbing early in the month. DO NOT gib more than 4 or 5 bloom buds per plant at a time. Repeat every other week through November. Begin debudding, leaving one bud on the terminal end of a branch.
October	Continue gibbing. Check air-layers. They can usually be taken off of the mother plant by now. Put them into pots with an appropriate growing medium and leave them in pots for one year. Fertilize your landscape plants with 0-0-22. Now through December is the best time to plant new camellias.
November	Continue gibbing. Take off air-layers if you have not done so.
December	A good time to spray for scale and insects if problems are observed. Most of all - enjoy your camellias for the holidays! (The camellia is often called the winter rose.)

Linda Luecking announced that Wilmot Gardens will hold an Open House for their new greenhouse facility on March 24th. GCS members will receive an invitation soon.


Several camellia plants from the remaining Camellia Show plants were auctioned.


