It has been hot and very dry, so the top priority is keeping plants, particularly recently planted ones, well watered. With the heat come the spider mites. Spray with horticultural oil (with some Orthene added if you can), but be sure to do it late in the day so the sun does not shine on it until it has dried. The spraying should be on both the top and underside of leaves, and this will take care of tea scale as well as mites.

Congratulations are due to all of us in GCS for the award presented to us on April 26th by the City of Gainesville for helping educate the public and helping to beautify the city. Especially recognized was the close working relationship GCS has with Kanapaha Botanical Gardens and the Master Gardener Program managed by IFAS. You can see the award at the May meeting, after which it will be hung in a prominent position at the Kanapaha building where we hold our meetings. We thank Alexis Caffrey of Kanapaha and Dr. Denise Debusk of IFAS for their cooperatin and especially thank our own Irma Velez for leading the many activities that led to the award.



President's Message

Our March meeting was later than usual and the April meeting is earlier, due to Easter coming on the 3rd Sunday of April. We enjoyed the program on the History of Camellias presented by Jim Dwyer. It was fun to hear of some of the characters that played a role in the discovery and development of the many camellias we have come to know and enjoy.

It is still nice to be working in the garden. Pruning should be on going or already done. I still have quite a few to care for, but it is enjoyable to be outside.

Our dry and warmer conditions are suitable for insect development. I have been using a granular pesticide from Bayer to help control beetle damage and it has generally been helpful in protecting the new flush of growth. Still, I must have missed a few or not put on enough, or not watered it in soon enough, as a few plants show some damage. These holes in the leaves are not lethal, but are just kind of unsightly. Orthene is a spray that can be used to help control the beetles.

Spider Mites like hot and dry conditions, so watch for damage, and spray with Horticultural Oil (Volck or other brand), but as temperatures are rising it is safest to spray late in the afternoon when temperatures are receding. It is best not to spray in mid-day as leaves can be scorched and may drop off if that is done. Make sure to check the underside of leaves for Tea Scale. The oil spray will help control both spider mites and Tea Scale.

Leaf drop at this time of year is normal, as when the new flush of growth comes on, the three year old leaves drop off.

If you have not yet applied fertilizer, it can still be done, although the first (and largest) flush of growth might not benefit so much, since an earlier application would have had time for absorption and use by the plant.

April is a good time to start air-layering. Some of you signed up to go to different places to get air-layers and we will be setting up schedules to go to the four locations planned for the process. Jerry Hogsette, Jay and Debbie Ellis, Jerome Ridaught, and the Swansons will have plants available from which to take air-layers.

Minutes for GCS Meeting - March 26, 2017

The March meeting was opened by John Swanson thanking Chuck and Bev Ritter for hosting the February meeting at their home and thanking Merry Reid and Irma Velez for providing refreshments for today's meeting.

John then introduced the guest speaker for our meeting, Dr. Jim Dwyer, past president of the Gulf Coast Camellia Society and his wife, Eileen. Dr. Dwyer's presentation charted the introduction of camellias to the western world and specifically the Gulf Coast region. He concluded his presentation by showing varieties of camellias that had been developed by growers in the Mobile, Alabama area. Eileen passed out an internet reference sheet of links to historical camellia websites. The Dwyers also brought examples of early camellia publications and catalogues for viewing.

Merry Reid advised that Charles Simon had just turned in additional monies that he had from the sale of remaining show plants. KANAPAHA GARDENS – Irma Velez

Irma Velez thanked those members who manned the GCS booth at the Kanapaha Gardens Spring Festival. Our booth location was in the back, but with a direct line of sight for visitors. As a result we had many people who stopped by for information about camellias that they had in their yards. New to our booth was signage about growing camellias and pictures of the different categories of camellias. Bruce Cavey had done an excellent job of ordering displays and signs for the booth, which he brought to today's meeting for viewing. These signs were first-rate educational materials.

Denise DeBusk, Alachua County Extension Agent, has instituted a series of Master Gardener led classes at Kanapaha. Irma Velez has given two classes featuring camellias. The first class was a variation of her Camellia 101 lecture she gives each year during the camellia show. There were 48 people in attendance. The second class was on pruning/air layering plants/camellias and 27 people attended this class. With such good attendance, Irma is hoping these classes will become an annual event.

Irma noted that several years ago when GCS looked into becoming a 501(c) 3 non-profit, one of the requirements we did not meet was an "education" component. With these classes and the educational materials we provide at our show, Irma suggested it might be time to take another look at a non-profit status.

GCS had committed to donate a camellia plant to the Kanapaha Camellia Garden. Diane Simon moved to donate Tama Loch Laurel Camellia, developed by Mark Crawford of Loch Laurel Nursery to be planted in the Kanapaha Camellia Garden. Seconded and motion carried. She also requested that this camellia be included in the list of camellias that have been developed by Gainesville area growers.

Irma Velez will have a pruning demonstration for GCS members in the Camellia Garden on Saturday, April 8th beginning at 9:00 a.m. She will show members how to prune camellias and then attendees can work on pruning plants in the garden. The goal is to complete the pruning that needs to be done. A sign-up sheet was circulated for those who would be available to participate.

ANNOUNCEMENTS

- Bruce Cavey and Hawser Pearce, with the camera assistance of John Swanson, made several videos on the care of camellia plants. The first was on pruning of a camellia plant and another on disbudding. Several more videos are in the planning stages, including one on air layering. John plans to upload these videos to our FaceBook page.

Thanks once again to Bev and Chuck Ritter for hosting the February meeting and to Jerry Hogsette and Hawser Pearce for their demonstrations on inarching and saw-cut methods of grafting camellias and the utility of those techniques.

The busy season for camellia maintenance is with us. There is still time to spray with horticultural oil for the control of tea scale and spider mites. It is not too late to apply a slow release fertilizer to give a boost to the new growth, and it's time to prune and shape plants to improve their efficient use of available light and to increase air flow for good plant health and vigor. Trimming off low-hanging branches can also be an aid to reducing the chances of scale insects getting well established.



Minutes for GCS Meeting - February 19, 2017

John Swanson began the business portion of our meeting by thanking Chuck and Bev for opening their home for the meeting. President's Message

Thanks also to Charles and Diane Simon for caring for our surplus plants until they are sold, and to Chuck and Bev Ritter for inviting GCS to the Melrose Friends of the Library event held near the end of January, as well as hosting the February meeting.

February is a busy month as the blooming season is gradually winding down and preparations for the next season are gearing up. This is the time to prune, fertilize and graft to upgrade plants.

Pruning is done to improve plant shape, control plant height, increase access of light to leaves, and improve air flow through the plants. Pruning of low-lying branches also helps reduce the chance for scale insect infestations.

Fertilize with slow release fertilizer to boost growth as those growth buds begin elongating and forming "candles" of new buds and leaves. Place the fertilizer around the drip line of plants and make sure it is watered in if there is no rainfall.

Now is the time to graft camellias to upgrade quality and introduce virus variegation, if desired. Our program this month includes two types of grafting procedures, inarching, covered by Jerry Hogsette, and use of the saw-cut method of grafting on established camellias by Hawser Pearce. Hawser instructed me in the use of this technique last year and I had pretty good luck, and plan to use it again this year.

We will have a short business meeting and then move outside for demonstrations on the grafting techniques.



Finally, we've had some much needed rain in the area, and it looks like more to come. This will be a help to recently planted camellias. Fall and Winter are the best times to plant camellias. You might think that because the visible part of the plant is dormant the whole plant is dormant. However, I am told that the dormant period is when roots grow and pull in nutrients to get ready for the first big growth flush that usually comes in February or March. So if you have been waiting, get your plants into the ground soon, and remember to plant them high.

Another item to consider is that we often get a freeze, sometimes a hard one, in December or early January. Best preparations include keeping plants well-watered, which helps the plants withstand the cold. It is also still the time to treat plants for spider mites and tea scale.

Our program on Waxing Camellias was presented by Inez Brooker, member of the Gainesville Garden Club.

Camellias for the plant auction were provided today by John Swanson and a preview plant from our show shipment.

November Program: WAXING CAMELLIAS Presented by Inez Brooker

Items needed:

fresh flowers (These may have leaves on the stem, but the leaves will not be waxed.) (Note: for camellias, semi-double flowers work best, but single or double flowers may also be waxed.)

several pounds of paraffin wax (available in one lb blocks where canning supplies are sold) mineral oil (For 5 lbs of wax, use 1 1/2 pints mineral oil, available at a drugstore.) candy thermometer

dipper (to transfer melted wax)
pan of cold water with ice

plastic gloves plastic fork

vase or other container with water to hold finished, waxed flowers

Heat wax in a double boiler or crockpot until melted. DO NOT COVER! The wax can explode!

Dip some of the melted wax into a 1 quart plastic bowl or similar container. Let wax cool to 135°F.

Lift flower by stem, holding leaves back. Dip flower quickly into melted wax with a twisting motion and lift. Shake off excess wax and immediately plunge flower into ice water bath. Hold there until wax cools and hardens.

Place stem in container to dry. Refrain from touching. Flowers should keep their color for several weeks.

Before waxing the next flower, use a plastic fork to skim any bits of loose wax out of the ice water. Add more ice as needed.

Things to do in November: spray for spider mites (graying or brown midrib of leaves) and scale insects (white stuff on underside of leaves, particularly those near the ground). The current dry spell is particularly troublesome for spider mites. Use horticultural oil and a pesticide if desired. Water when needed, at least a good soaking once a week for established plants and twice a week for newly planted ones.

We have a special addition to our November Meeting. For about 45 minutes from 1-1:45 we will hold an informal workshop on flower preparations for the show, what judges look for in winning blooms and how to fill our entry cards, and a chance to reduce the perceived mystery of showing blooms. Of course gibbing is needed to have blooms for these shows, but they are good warm ups for our show coming up on January 7th-8th, 2017. Yes, the year is flying by!

October is a good time to plant camellias, giving their root systems several cooler months to develop and become established. Check on your air-layers, as they can usually be taken off during October and November and potted up. Our program this month will feature air-layering.

No feedback yet from either of our Nursery plant suppliers. We should be hearing from them soon.

If it is or remains dry, watch for and control spider mites and scale insects. Oil spray can work well if the temperatures are not much above 80°.

Keep disbudding as needed to ensure better size of blooms for show or home use.

Minutes for GCS Meeting - September 18, 2016

President's Message

Wow, summer is moving along quickly. It has been a good summer for camellia growth, and a good summer for spider mites and some other critters. Aphids and grasshoppers have also been noted. I personally have had some plants hit hard by spider mites. I've sprayed using some miticides and they seem to help. Horticulture oil spray and Neem oil also works, but there can be some sunburn arising from spraying when the temps get above 90, which has been pretty often this summer.

I mentioned bud formation and growth, so that means it is also time for disbudding. Most double buds should be reduced to leaving just one. Some varieties heavily set multiple buds. Varieties like Maroon and Gold, Cherries, Jubilee, and Fragrant Pink are loaded and require a lot of work if you want to stay ahead of them. Best not to start too early, as that often stimulates the plant to put our more buds. If you are growing for show, disbudding is important to get good sized blooms.

If, however, you are just disbudding for your own enjoyment, one strategy is to disbud according to size and location of buds, leaving one large, one medium, and perhaps a third smaller one, so that when the first one is finished blooming, the second won't be far behind, and that one followed by the third. Disbud by gently grasping the bud you wish to retain, and then gently twisting off the extra flower bud.

Now is also the time to start gibbing if you plan to show blooms at the fall shows, the first of which is in conjunction with the Georgia National Fair in Perry, GA, on Oct. 8th. As far as I know, the second show is on Nov. 5th in Boston, GA, sponsored by the Wiregrass Camellia Society in the Quitman area. Byron, GA, usually has one in mid-November, but I have not yet received the info on the date.

Minutes for GCS Meeting - May 15, 2016

The Gainesville Camellia Society annual potluck began at 1:00 p.m. John Swanson thanked Eleanor and John Thrasher for their fine work in coordinating the details of the luncheon and members for their delicious potluck dishes.

At 2:00 p.m. the regular meeting began. There were no additions or corrections to the April minutes. Charles Simon moved to accept the minutes as published in the newsletter; seconded by Paul Warner; approved.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

- TREASURER'S REPORT Merry Reid

 - Checking Account \$1,402.41
 - Total Funds \$12,835.75

Patrick Andrews noted that having more than \$15,000 in our treasury could potentially open GCS up to additional legal regulation. Discussion followed regarding options to keep our organization compliant. Approximately \$7,000 - \$8,000 is the initial cost required to put on our annual show; some of which is recovered through plant sales. Charles Simon suggested the discussion of uses for any surplus funds be moved to the Board of Directors meeting later this month. Members who have suggestions for using these funds should give them to Board members prior to the meeting.

Irma Velez moved that Gainesville Camellia Society donate \$500 to Kanapaha Gardens designated to be used toward the purchase of fertilizer for the camellia gardens at Kanapaha. Patrick Andrews seconded the motion and discussion followed. Jay Ellis brought up the topic of the poor placement of the GCS booth at the Kanapaha Spring Festival and charging entrance fees for volunteers who man the booth. Irma Velez advised there has been a lack of communication from Kanapaha regarding the procedures they require for participation of educational vendors. She will talk with Kanapaha for the 2017 Spring Festival to ensure the problems that have happened in the past do not continue. As soon as the festival paperwork comes out (usually in January) Irma will request that our booth be assigned to the educational area of the festival which should eliminate past concerns. After clarification of these issues, the motion was approved by members.

Patrick Andrews made a motion Gainesville Camellia Society donate \$500 to the American Camellia Society General Operating Fund to be used for operating expenses of the Massee Lane Gardens. Seconded by Irma Velez; approved.

Jay Ellis made a motion to send a \$25 Memorial donation to the American Camellia Society in honor of Clayton Mathis, who had lived in Gainesville and was renowned among camellia growers and who passed away earlier this year. Charles Simon moved to amend the amount to \$100; seconded by Jerry Hogsette. The amended motion passed.

Patrick Andrews administered to oath of office to the officers and board members present. He expressed appreciation for John Swanson and the work he has done as President this past year. John Thrasher also expressed appreciation for Anna Langford and her efforts in producing the GCS newsletter.

Minutes for Board of Directors' Meeting - May 21, 2016

The Board of Directors' meeting was called to order at the home of John and Dinh Swanson at 2:10 pm by John Swanson. Present were John Swanson, Irma Velez, Karen Peeples, Merry Reid, Chuck Ritter, Charles Simon, Joel Schwiebert, Jay Ellis, Nicki Whittaker, Bruce Cavey, Ruth Melton, Bill Hayes, and Jerry Hogsette. Guests were Dinh Swanson, Annette Schwiebert and Diane Simon. In preparation for today's discussion, John Swanson read the section of the Gainesville Camellia Society Bylaws which dealt with the purpose of the organization.

As a follow up to the topic of collection of sales tax for our annual camellia sales, Joel Schwiebert contacted the Florida Department of Revenue who advised that our annual sale fell under the category of an "Occasional Use Sale" and required no collection of sales taxes. Joel Schwiebert moved that GCS accept the Florida Department of Revenue's opinion that the Gainesville Camellia Society's annual camellia sale falls under the category of an Occasional Use Sale according to Florida law and does not have to collect sales tax. (Reference Florida Administrative Code and Florida Administrative Register Rule 12A-1.037) The motion was seconded by Jerry Hogsette and approved.

The following topics were discussed with regard to use of excess funds currently in the treasury.

- Trust Fund The current balance is approximately \$11,500. The cost of putting on the annual show is approximately \$8,000 (\$5,000 for plants; \$1,600 in prizes; and \$1,500 for operational items). Plant sales should recoup the cost of the plant purchases. In keeping approximately \$8,000 in reserve for the next year's show, there is about \$2,000-\$3,000 of excess funds.
- Kanapaha Gardens Storage Shed It was suggested some of the excess funds be used to purchase a storage shed that could be placed in the Kanapaha Gardens maintenance area for GCS use. Supplies for the show could be stored there, as well as maintenance tools, supplies to be used at meetings such as gibberellic acid or fertilizers. Jerry Hogsette moved that Irma Velez approach Kanapaha Gardens to see if this was a possibility and what requirements would Kanapaha Gardens or other regulatory agencies have regarding GCS putting a shed for GCS on the grounds at Kanapaha. Seconded by Charles Simon.

Irma Velez gave an overview of preparations for the January show. Our show will not compete with the Tallahassee show, so grower participation should be good. Jerry Hogsette will arrange for judges and the pre-show dinner for them. Bruce Cavey is in charge of Clerking; Patrick Andrews, Placement (to be confirmed); Charles Simon, plant sales; Merry Reid, Information/Education; Karen Peeples, Publicity; and Dinh Swanson, Hospitality. Irma Velez will ask Tara Gill if she will again cater the judges' luncheon on Saturday. Karen Peeples moved that \$150 be allocated for Publicity expenses; seconded by Irma Velez and approved. Jerry Hogsette has approximately 70 plants that will be available for sale at the show.

It was suggested that the Business Manager of Wilmot Gardens, Bailey Hillman, be extended an honorary membership in the Gainesville Camellia Society. It was felt giving an honorary membership to the Business Manager was an excellent idea. She is new to her position and

perhaps she could be invited to be a guest speaker at a future meeting. John Swanson, as President, would write a letter to Ms. Hillman extending an honorary GCS membership to her.

Charles Simon moved that the editor of the Gainesville Camellia Society Newsletter be included as a regular member of the Board of Directors. Seconded by Jerry Hogsette; approved.

Jay Ellis advised he would host the January regular meeting at his home and gardens in Keystone Heights.

Suggestions for other GCS activities:

- Schedule a meeting in the Spring to tour the camellia gardens at North Florida Regional Medical Center. There are approximately 50 plants in the garden which is over 30 years old. The plants contain nametags and Jerry Hogsette would be able to give an informal tour of the gardens.
- Schedule a field trip in December to Christine's Camellias in Quitman, Georgia. John Swanson will contact the Selphs requesting a potential date convenient to them so that we could begin to promote the trip to members.
- Creation of a compendium of plants in gardens of members as a resource for anyone looking for a particular plant.
- Establishing an area in Kanapaha's camellia garden dedicated to plants that have been developed/registered by members of GCS. Irma Velez noted there is an overgrown area of the camellia garden that if cleaned out would be a good area for such a project. Master Gardeners provide weekly maintenance to the camellia garden, but this project would require some major work to accomplish.
- Workshops to expand skills in grafting, air layering, pest control, etc.

Bruce Cavey felt that the GCS booth and placement at the Kanapaha Gardens Spring Festival did not showcase GCS as well as it could. Irma Velez noted that communication problems with Kanapaha the past 2 years had resulted in poor placement of our booth and she said that she would make sure this problem was corrected. Bruce suggested more signage and colorful displays and perhaps an interactive display. He volunteered to head a project to improve our display and present his thoughts at a regular meeting.

John Swanson asked members to give some thoughts on ways to further promote interest and participation among new members to GCS.

Joel Schwiebert brought up the topic of plants other than camellias being auctioned at each meeting which tended to extend the meeting time. Members discussed the auction and it was determined that the value of a variety of plants available outweighed the additional time added to the meeting. Time would be given between the end of the meeting and the auction for those who did not wish to stay for the auction would be able to leave.

Jerry Hogsette made a motion to adjourn the meeting; seconded by Charles Simon. Meeting adjourned at 4:20 p.m.
