President's Message



Our meeting is a little later in the month because of the Easter Holiday. Hope everyone had a nice day. It was beautiful and did not help my spring fever at all. The beautiful light green foliage associated with new growth is still prevalent on my camellias. So are the numerous holes made by the small beetles who coordinate their feeding periods with the appearance of new growth on many plants. The damage seems very heavy this year compares with last year, but thanks goodness it is only a cosmetic effect. We are still having some unseasonably cool evenings which should reduce beetle flight just a bit.

The flowers are gone (for a few months) but there is still plenty to do in the garden with your camellias. Air layering can be started at any time and as you probably know, the Swanson's are hosting an air layering event in their garden on Friday the 26th. Sounds like fun with lots of plants to choose from. For those of you who do not have experience with air layering, this is a great opportunity to learn how easy it is.





The photos are from an air layering clinic held at the Ritters' garden on March 18, 2007. The photo on page 1 shows some of the participants. Recognize anyone? In the photo on the above right you can see Chuck Ritter making an adjustment of some sort near the foil-wrapped air layer, and in the photo on the left, Bob Weidman is using a pocket knife to scrape the cambium layer from the branch he is going to air layer.

For those of you looking for sasanquas to plant, there was a god choice at Lowe's in Butler plaza, including some of the October Magic series. If you plant this time in the year it is best not to promote much growth by not providing heavy doses of nitrogen fertilizer. Instead use a super phosphate granular if you can find it, or a bloom fertilizer for bulbs or other flowers. Keep these newly planted camellias well-watered during the hot months to come and they should do well. For established plants, round two of the spring fertilizer application is approaching. Wait until the current new growth hardens off and apply a second dose, usually half of the first dose.

I hope everyone and their plants are doing well. I'm sure we will have an entertaining speaker on Sunday. Look forward to seeing you on Sunday.

Chuck and Bev Ritter are opening their gardens for an opportunity to air layer Kanjiro and Egao plants which provide quality rooting stock to graft improved varieties of camellias. The Ritters have over 100 plants from which to take air layers. The date for this opportunity is tentatively scheduled for May 11th. Interested persons should make a note on the signup sheets being distributed for John Swanson's air layering.

Charles Simon advised members who were doing air layers from their personal plants for sale at the camellia show, focus should be on some of the older varieties. He will provide a list of possibilities in the newsletter.

Irma Velez introduced Dr. CraigTisher, retired Dean of the University Of Florida College Of Medicine. First Dr. Tisher thanked the Gainesville Camellia Society for their financial support of Wilmot Gardens. He is now the director of Wilmot Gardens and presented members with an overview of the gardens and the project to replant camellias from the Gordy Estate camellia gardens to Wilmot Gardens and the University.

The family of Clarence and Lillian Gordy offered the University of Florida the opportunity to acquire approximately one half of the plants from their gardens. Wilmot purchased approximately 680 plants for the purpose of planting in Wilmot Gardens and around the University campus.

Thus far 340 have been dug up and all but 15 have been transplanted at the IFAS landscape facility on 23rd Terrace. Some of the plants were so large it required a tree spade for removal. Dr. Tisher explained the process of moving and replanting the first group of plants. All the plants have been catalogued and photographed for record keeping. One hundred of the plants have been planted at Wilmot Gardens on in an area to be designated the Gordy Camellia Garden. It appears 99 of the 100 plants are doing well after the transplant. Thirty-five plants have been placed at the Dasburg House, the residence of the University President. All plants will have identification to reference the Gordy collection.

Dr. Tisher thanked Irma Velez for her many efforts on behalf of Wilmot Gardens.

With that in mind, Irma said that she would be at Wilmot on Tuesday to do some pruning of the camellias and extended an invitation to join her. She would be there at 8:30 a.m. and parking would be by voucher in the adjacent parking garage.

Jay Ellis brought a tray of blooms from his gardens for display and Anna and Gerald Langford brought grapefruit from their home for members to enjoy. Refreshments were provided by Mona Rippe and drinks by Anna and Gerald Langford.

Mark Crawford of Loch Laurel Nursery, along with his wife, Sherrida, gave a slide presentation of their trip to Nantes, France for the 2018 International Camellia Society Congress. Because Mark is a commercial grower, he gave a unique perspective to camellia gardens in Europe.



She has submitted the necessary paperwork to Kanapaha Gardens and will advise members once a space has been assigned for our tent.

Things to do in February:

February is a busy month as the blooming season is gradually winding down and preparations for the next season are gearing up. It is the time to prune, fertilize and graft to upgrade plants.

Pruning is done to help shape, control plant height, and increase access of light to leaves and improve air flow through the plants. Pruning of low-lying branches also helps reduce the chance for scale insect infestations.

Fertilize with slow release fertilizer to boost growth as those growth buds begin elongating and forming "candles" of new buds and leaves. Place the fertilizer around the drip line of plants and make sure it is watered in if there is no rainfall.

Now is the time to graft camellias to upgrade quality and introduce virus variegation, if desired.

Things to do in January:

In January you may want to start pruning and shaping your plants, although you should wait until blooming is finished for each plant. This is a time that most of us fertilize, and fertilizer should be a slow release type, preferably, like Hollytone, Osmocote, or Harrell's. To prevent the spread of the blossom rot organism, pick up all spent blooms and put into the garbage, not into a compost pile.

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Things to do in December:

Fall and Winter are the best times to plant camellias. You might think that because the visible part of the plant is dormant the whole plant is dormant. However, the dormant period is when roots grow and pull in nutrients to get ready for the first big growth flush that usually comes in February or March. So if you have been waiting, get your plants into the ground soon, and remember to plant them high.

Another item to consider is that we often get a freeze, sometimes a hard one, in December or early January. Best preparations include keeping plants well-watered, which helps the plants withstand the cold. It is also still the time to treat plants for spider mites and tea scale.



GUEST SPEAKER

Hawser Pearce, our Program Chairman, introduced our guest speaker, Ms. Ilene Hart, a highly experienced grower who has registered four Camellia cultivars, to speak to us about propagating Camellias from seeds.

Ms. Hart urged us all to join the ACS and have free access to over 200 botanical gardens across the US! She brought in seeds from a number of identified seed-parents to give to members after her talk. She spoke about recent advances in DNA testing that can be used to narrow identification and differences among cultivars. For example, there is only one species Camellia Japonica. It's a red single, small and not very impressive. All the remaining hundreds of named Japonica Camellias are cultivars of the original.

Seeds are easy to grow but you have to be patient. It can take 5-12 years to see the first bloom from a seedling. Some people graft them to get an earlier look at the bloom. Eight or nine out of ten seeds will yield the original cultivar in red, pink and occasionally white.

She noted that few Japonica cultivars have listed parents whereas all reticulatas are required to list both parents. She would like to see the same requirements for Japonicas. Most Japonica cultivars have parents listed as "chance seedling". The seed parent is known but not the pollen parent.

Pick seeds when pods turn brown, usually from August to September. Remove the seeds from the pod and use a small hammer to 'crack' the epidural layer just slightly. Place in a glass of water overnight. Plant sinkers and discard floaters.

Put 6-8 seeds in a community pot and cover with one quarter to one half inch of dirt made from two parts peat and one part Perlite. It can take 3-6 months for the seeds to germinate.

After the plants have two or three sets of new leaves, discard any weak plants and cut the remaining plants out of the community pot in plugs. At this point cut off the bottom half of the tap root to encourage the outward growth of the remaining roots, and transplant the plug into its own one-gallon pot.

ADJOURNMENT AND AUCTION

The meeting was adjourned, and over a dozen plants, including six 2-year air-layered camellias (*Tama Electra, Yuletide, Mathotiana*, and others), supplied by John Swanson were presented for auction. Chuck Ritter donated a healthy 3-year air-layered *Bev Ritter*, winner of the 2017 "Best Mutant" award, for auction. All plants sold.

The minutes and the Treasurer's Report were accepted.


Jerry asked for Old Business, of which there was none. He then called for New Business.




Early Autumn

Things to do in September

This has been a good summer for camellia growth. If you are seeing damage from spider mites, you can spray with miticides, horticulture oil spray, or Neem oil, but there may be some sunburn if you spray when temperatures are above 90°. Spray on both the top and underside of leaves and this will take care of tea scale as well as mites.

It's time to begin disbudding. Most double buds should be reduced to just one. Some varieties heavily set multiple buds and require a lot of work if you want to stay ahead of them. If you are growing for show, disbudding is important to get good sized blooms.

If, however, you are just disbudding for your own enjoyment, one strategy is to disbud leaving one large, one medium, and perhaps a third smaller one, so that when the first one is finished blooming, the second won't be far behind, and that one followed by the third. Disbud by gently grasping the bud you wish to retain, and then gently twisting off the extra flower bud(s).

Now is also the time to start gibbing if you plan to show blooms at the fall shows, the first of which is in conjunction with the Georgia National Fair in October.
