MINUTES OF THE FEBRUARY <u>MEETING</u> by Madeline Braisted

President Susan Dunn began the meeting at 6:05 with 19 people present. We celebrated Marge Hendon's 61st birthday with goodies and a birthday cake. Susan spoke about our camellia show: 350 people were present and more than 1000 blooms were entered! Positive comments about the breakfast (provided by Cash and Gwynne Pealer) and the new location were heard all morning. Bob Weidman moved to approve the minutes from the January meeting, seconded by Frank Braisted. Laura Perdomo gave the treasurer's report.

New members were introduced: Daryl and Edna Driscoll from Ocala Forest and Carol and Bob Burkert from Ocala. Laura Perdomo will e-mail a list of members with phone numbers to Patrick Andrews and it will be included with the February newsletter.

Marge announced that she has 16 plants left over from the show for sale for \$20.00. The March meeting will be a pot-luck dinner. The meat will be supplied by the club.

Under new business, we discussed whether next year's show (January 24, 2015) should be one day or two. Susan, Marge, and Zlata will form a committee to look for other venues for next year's show. We also discussed the issue of helpers carrying flowers to the wrong tables, clerking, and runners pulling off bottom tags. A suggestion was made to bring flyers to Ocala community garden clubs for their December meetings for publicity. A change in meeting night and location was also discussed. It presently costs \$450 a year plus a deposit for damages here at the library.

The nominating committee recommended the following officers and directors for next year: President, Susan Dunn; Vice-President, Bob Weidman; Secretary, Gynne Pealer; Treasurer, Laura Perdomo. Directors: Patrick Andrews, Charles Nichols, Marge Hendon, Madeline Braisted, Charlotte Bunyan, and Jill Reed. Susan mentioned that we can maintain the camellia garden at Silver Springs State Park. Bob Weidman demonstrated air-layering with several handouts. Raffle for a camellia was won by Edna Driscoll. The meeting ended with a plant auction to benefit the Ocala Camellia Society.

CAMELLIA CULTURE -SPRING AND SUMMER

GRAFTING: There is still plenty of time for grafting, although all grafting should be completed before new growth begins. Scions will keep in a sealed plastic bag in the refrigerator for three weeks or longer, so even if you aren't ready to graft immediately, cut your scions now, before they start to grow, and store them for later. Once the growth bud has begun to feather it is too late to be used as a scion.

SPRAYING: Spider mites and scale insects can still be a problem at this time a year, so keep a close eye out for them. Spider mites cause the leaf to appear bronze, particularly along the central rib, and can ruin the look of the foliage. Scale insects can be seen on the lower surface of leaves and result in yellowing and dropping of the leaves. You can spray with chemicals such as Orthene to control mites, but a better, more environmentally friendly solution would be to spray with insecticidal oil (such as Super Fine or Ultra Pure) or insecticidal soap. These oils and soaps kill mites and scales but be sure to coat both sides of the leaves, and do not spray during hot temperatures. Check with local camellia growers for other spraying tips and to find out what they spray with to control these insects.

PLANTING: You can still plant and move camellias, as they are still dormant. Potted camellias can be planted at any time of the year, but remember to water at least twice a week. Be sure to plant them above the soil level to allow for settling. Never plant a camellia at a level lower than it is growing in the pot.

MULCHING: Camellias should be mulched to help keep the roots cool and to help the soil retain water. Mulch also cuts down on the need to weed, while contributing to the organic content of your soil.

WATERING: Watering is extremely important during the blooming season, as flowers consist mostly of water, and during our usually dry spring, when camellias start to put on a major flush of growth. A well-watered plant will bloom much more freely and the flowers will be much larger if the plant is watered well. It is very important to water regularly during any dry periods. Camellias should receive a deep watering (1 inch) once a week. This is true year-round, but is more crucial during dry periods.

FERTILIZING: It's time to start thinking about applying the first round of fertilizer to your camellias. You can use any fertilizer, but a Camellia, Azalea, Gardenia fertilizer is ideal. Be sure to spread the fertilizer out to the drip line. Many local camellia growers fertilize during the first week of April, the middle week of May, and the last week of June or first week of August. Other gardeners fertilize at the beginning of each season, so this would mean the first application would be in the latter part of March. Your last application of fertilizer should probably be in late August or early September, as fertilizing after this may cause camellias to grow again, and the new growth may not harden off before cold weather starts. Some growers like to apply a light application of a low-nitrogen fertilizer in the fall to stimulate root growth.

PRUNING: There is plenty of time to prune, but it is best to prune before growth has begun in earnest. Prune for shape, to limit the size, and to produce new growth for next season's flower buds. Be sure to remove dead wood. You may wish to seal large cuts with a commercial tree sealer. After pruning one plant, sanitize your clippers with a mild bleach solution before pruning another plant.

AIR LAYERING: Air layering can be done at any time where temperatures remain above freezing. Some people air layer as early as February, but many wait until May, when the parent plants are actively growing and the bark peels away easily. Air layers done in May are generally ready to harvest by August and September, and on into the fall for some slower-rooting varieties.

CUTTINGS: Cuttings are generally taken during the summer, around June or July, when they will root quite readily. Reticulatas are the hardest to root (and many varieties won't root from cuttings at all), so it's a safer bet to stick with japonicas and non-reticulata hybrids. Take cuttings with about four leaves; snip off the lower two leaves and cut the others in half. Trim the base just below a leaf axil, dip it in a rooting hormone, and insert the cutting into a small pot filled with a moist, sandy potting medium. You may want to put the pot in a plastic bag (to keep the air around the cutting humid) and place in a shaded spot. Check the bag regularly and add water when needed. The roots don't develop immediately, but they should form within 4-6 weeks on some varieties, longer on others. Cuttings can be taken at other times of the year, too, but rooting takes longer.

MINUTES OF THE JANUARY MEETING

President Susan Dunn opened the meeting with reminders: February refreshments: Marge and Laura; March meeting: Pot Luck Dinner

President Dunn introduced the speaker: Judy Brown of Garden Gate Nursery in Gainesville. Topic: Managing a Small Independent Nursery

Minutes of last meeting were accepted as printed in the newsletter. Treasurer reported a balance of \$6267.95 and reminded members that there are 10 Camellia Show Awards that still needed donations.

Old Business: Patrick & Susan discussed the Camellia Show. David Holmes will have an article in the January 18 Star Banner about camellias and will announce the show. Idea for future show: Susan mentioned a card published by the Camellia Society of Central Florida in Orlando that describes their show. The card is distributed to nurseries in the vicinity. Volunteers needed: Friday afternoon, 1/24 for set up; Saturday no later than 7:00 for taking in submissions; 10 people have already signed up for this; Saturday by 9:45: 12 clerks and 3 rovers to follow judges are needed.

New Business: Silver Springs State Park discussed by Susan -- volunteers are needed to improve the gardens. Volunteer forms were distributed. There is a camellia grove at the park that The Camellia Society could adopt as a community project. We will discuss this further after the Show. The Silver Springs Park could have space for the Camellia Show after renovations are completed but now date for that is available.

Nominating Committee must be appointed this month by the president and report to the February meeting. Patrick presented the revised by-laws. Charles Nichols moved the by-laws be approved and Joe Sabo seconded. Membership voted to approve the by-laws.

Reminders: Sabo's open house next Sunday; Bob & Patrick's open house the following week.

After the camellia auction, the meeting was adjourned at 8:50.

CAMELLIA CULTURE -- WINTER

PLANTING: This is the best time of year to plant camellias. They are dormant now, so they won't be putting on leaf growth. The roots, however, will continue to grow all winter. You may want to add a little Super Triple Phosphate fertilizer to the hole when planting, but don't overdo it. This fertilize promotes root growth but not leaf growth. Be sure to plant them above the soil level to allow for settling. Never plant a camellia at a level lower than it is growing in the pot. Keep newly planted camellias well watered.

WATERING: Watering is critical in November and December, since these can be very dry months. It is very important to water regularly during any dry periods. Camellias should receive a deep watering (1 inch) once a week. This is true year-round, but is more crucial during dry periods.

SPRAYING: Spider mites and scale insects can still be a problem at this time a year, so keep a close eye out for them. Spider mites cause the leaf to appear bronze, particularly along the central rib, and can ruin the look of the foliage.

Scale insects can be seen on the lower surface of leaves and result in yellowing and dropping of the leaves. These oils kill mites and scales but be sure to coat both sides of the leaves, and do not spray during hot temperatures. Check with local camellia growers for other spraying tips and to find out what they spray with to control these insects.

GIBBING: You can still gib blooms to make sure you have blooms to enter into specific shows this winter. Gibbing is the process of removing the growth bud next to a flower bud and filling the "cup" with a drop of gibberellic acid. This causes the remaining flower bud to swell and bloom much earlier than it normally would, and in most cases the flower is much larger. Be sure not to gib more than one or two buds on small bushes, if at all. You can order a gib on the web; just Google Progibb.

DISBUDDING: Continue disbudding if you find more than one bud at the tips of branches to ensure that the remaining bud will open larger and more beautiful.

YOU ARE INVITED TO OUR TWELFTH ANNUAL CAMELLIA OPEN HOUSE



CAMELLIA CULTURE -- WINTER

PLANTING: This is the best time of year to plant camellias. They are dormant now, so they won't be putting on leaf growth. The roots, however, will continue to grow all winter. You may want to add a little Super Triple Phosphate fertilizer to the hole when planting, but don't overdo it. This fertilize promotes root growth but not leaf growth. Be sure to plant them above the soil level to allow for settling. Never plant a camellia at a level lower than it is growing in the pot. Keep newly planted camellias well watered.

WATERING: Watering is critical in November and December, since these can be very dry months. It is very important to water regularly during any dry periods. Camellias should receive a deep watering (1 inch) once a week. This is true year-round, but is more crucial during dry periods.

SPRAYING: Spider mites and scale insects can still be a problem at this time a year, so keep a close eye out for them. Spider mites cause the leaf to appear bronze, particularly along the central rib, and can ruin the look of the foliage.

Scale insects can be seen on the lower surface of leaves and result in yellowing and dropping of the leaves. You can spray with chemicals such as Orthene to control mites, but a better, more environmentally friendly solution would be to spray with insecticidal oil (such as Ultra Fine or Ultra Pure). These oils kill mites and scales but be sure to coat both sides of the leaves, and do not spray during hot temperatures. Check with local camellia growers for other spraying tips and to find out what they spray with to control these insects.

GIBBING: You can still gib blooms to make sure you have blooms to enter into specific shows this winter. Gibbing is the process of removing the growth bud next to a flower bud and filling the "cup" with a drop of gibberellic acid. This causes the remaining flower bud to swell and bloom much earlier than it normally would, and in most cases the flower is much larger. Be sure not to gib more than one or two buds on small bushes, if at all. You can order a gib on the web; just Google Progibb.

DISBUDDING: Continue disbudding if you find more than one bud at the tips of branches to ensure that the remaining bud will open larger and more beautiful.

CONSTITUTION OF THE OCALA CAMELLIA SOCIETY

ARTICLE 1 – NAME

The name of this Society shall be the Ocala Camellia Society, organized at Ocala, Florida. The Society is not to engage in any business or commercial enterprise. Headquarters of the Society shall be located in Ocala, Florida.

ARTICLE 2 – OBJECTIVES

The objectives and purposes of this Society shall be as follows:

- 1. To stimulate and extend appreciation of the genus Camellia.
- 2. To actively cooperate in the work of the American Camellia Society.
- 3. To develop, acquire, and disseminate information concerning the camellia its origin, history, and culture.
- 4. To organize exhibitions of camellias at various times and places under the rules of the American Camellia Society to stimulate interest in the cultivation of the camellia.
- 5. To promote uniformity in camellia nomenclature and clarification and standardization of varietal classification of camellias.

ARTICLE 3 – MEMBERS AND VOTING

Section 1. Members. All persons who are interested in the culture of camellias, whether professional or amateur, shall be eligible for membership upon payment of dues.

Section 2. Voting. All members in good standing shall be entitled to one vote on all questions.

BY-LAWS OF THE OCALA CAMELLIA SOCIETY

ARTICLE 1 – NAME

Section 1. As provided in the Constitution, the title of this society shall be the Ocala Camellia Society.

ARTICLE 2 – LOCATION

Section 1. The location of this society shall be in Ocala, Marion County, Florida.

ARTICLE 3 – MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. Active Members. The number of active members shall be unlimited.

Section 2. Honorary Members. Honorary members shall be persons who have contributed a significant service to the Ocala Camellia Society, recommended by the Executive Board, and presented to the Society for approval at any general meeting by a 2/3 vote of the active members present. They shall not hold office, vote, or be subject to dues or any assessments.

ARTICLE 4 – MEETINGS

Section 1. There shall be regular meetings of the Ocala Camellia Society, starting with the month of September or October (at the discretion of the Executive Committee) and ending in March. A calendar shall be developed by the Executive Committee and presented to the membership at the March meeting. Special meetings may be called at the discretion of the Executive Committee.

Section 2. A quorum shall consist of at least 25% of the active membership to transact business.

Section 3. The place of meetings shall be any place approved by the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE 5 – ELECTIONS

Section 1. A President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, and at least three (but up to six) Directors shall be elected for a term of one year, at the last meeting, to take office on April 1 of that year.

Section 2. An Officer or Director may succeed himself/herself in the same office for one additional term. Any deviation from this must be approved by a 2/3 vote of the active members present.

Section 3. The President shall appoint a Nominating Committee in January of each year. The Nominating Committee shall consist of three members: the Chairman shall be a member of the Executive Committee (i.e., an Officer or a Director), and the other two members shall be non-office holding members. The report of the Nominating Committee shall be made at the February general meeting, with election being held at the March general meeting.

ARTICLE 6 – DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The President shall preside at all meetings of the Society and of the Executive Committee, appoint chairpersons of any and all committees deemed necessary, and to perform such duties as pertain to the office. The President shall conduct at least one but up to two meetings of the Executive Committee each year to discuss Society matters not requiring a decision by the general membership. The President shall be the Chairman of the Show Committee for the annual camellia show and appoint all subchairmen of the committee.

Section 2. The Vice-President shall officiate in the absence of the President. The Vice-President shall also be the Program Chairman, organizing programs and speakers for each meeting.

Section 3. The Secretary shall conduct correspondence relating to the Society's interest, shall record the minutes of all meetings, and shall maintain and keep all records. The Secretary shall also serve as Publicity Chairperson under the Show Committee to obtain publicity from various sources such as newspapers, magazines, television and radio stations, etc.

Section 4. The Treasurer shall receive and account for all money of the Society, paying out same upon the orders of the Executive Committee. The Treasurer shall serve as chairman of the Membership and Finance Committees.

Section 5. The Directors shall assist the Officers in all matters, and shall attend any Executive Committee meetings set by the President.

ARTICLE 7 – DUES

Section 1. The annual dues of the Ocala Camellia Society shall be reviewed by the Executive Committee and approved by 2/3 of voting members present. Any changes to the annual dues shall be presented at the final meeting of the year for approval by 2/3 of the voting members present. Membership in the American Camellia Society is recommended but not required, and is considered as important as membership in the Ocala Camellia Society.

Section 2. Dues must be paid to be a member in good standing.

ARTICLE 8 – VACANCIES

Section 1. The Executive Committee shall have the power to fill vacancies of any Officer or Director.

ARTICLE 9 – COMMITTEES

Section 1. The Standing Committees shall be Annual Camellia Show, Programs, Publicity, Membership, and Finance. The President is the Chairman of the Annual Camellia Show Committee. The Vice-President is the Chairman of the Programs Committee. The Secretary is the Chairman of the Publicity Committee. The Treasurer is the Chairman of the Membership and Finance Committees. The President shall appoint chairpersons for any additional committees deemed necessary to conduct the business of the Society.

ARTICLE 10 – AMENDMENTS

Section 1. The Constitution or By-Laws may be amended by a 2/3 vote of the Society members present, in accordance with Article 4, Section 2, upon recommendation of the Executive Committee.

CAMELLIA CULTURE – LATE SUMMER AND EARLY FALL

DISBUDDING: Disbudding is the process of removing all but one bud from the tip of a branch. You should never leave two or more flower buds side by side if you want big, beautiful flowers. Plants have only so much energy for each bud, and if there are too many, none of the buds may open completely. You may also want to remove interior buds from a branch, as these will also take energy from the terminal bud. Some growers even take single buds from some branch tips so the plant's energy will be directed to even fewer buds. If you have ever wondered how some growers consistently have larger flowers, this is the reason. Don't be shy about removing buds.

GIBBING: Gibbing is the process of removing the growth bud next to a flower bud and filling the "cup" with a drop of gibberellic acid. This causes the remaining flower bud to swell and bloom much earlier than it normally would, and in most cases the flower is much larger. Start gibbing around Labor Day, and treat several buds on large bushes at weekly intervals. Don't gib more than one or two buds on small bushes, if at all. You can order a gib on the web; just Google Progibb.

SPRAYING: Spider mites and scale insects are still a problem at this time a year, so keep a close eye out for them. Spider mites cause the leaf to appear bronze, particularly along the central rib, and can ruin the look of the foliage. Scale insects can be seen on the lower surface of leaves and result in yellowing and dropping of the leaves. You can spray with Orthene (or other chemical) to control mites. Insecticidal oil (such as Super Fine) kills mites and scales but be sure to coat both sides of the leaves, and do not spray during hot temperatures. Check with local camellia growers for other spraying tips and to find out what they spray with to control these insects.

COLLECTING AND PLANTING SEEDS: Some of your camellia seeds have probably already matured, but you can continue to collect and plant fresh seed through September. Place the seeds immediately in moist vermiculite or other soilless mix, and cover with plastic wrap until they sprout, at which time you can plant them in pots.

PLANTING: Potted camellias can be planted at any time of the year, but remember to water at least twice a week. Be sure to plant them above the soil level to allow for settling. Never plant a camellia at a level lower than it is growing in the pot.

WATERING: It is very important to water regularly during any dry periods. Camellias should receive a deep watering (1 inch) once a week. This is true yearround, but is more crucial during dry periods.

FERTILIZING: You probably do not want to fertilize after the end of August or very beginning of September, as you do not want to encourage plant growth at this time of year. You can use any fertilizer up until this time, but if you fertilize after September, you should use only a very low nitrogen fertilizer, and fertilize lightly. Be sure to spread the fertilizer out to the drip line.
