I checked them this week and about 50 of them are actively growing, and NONE are dead. It is going to be a good grafting season.

The camellia shows of Tallahassee, Quitman, Boston, Byron, Pensacola, Gainesville, Ocala, Atlanta, Columbus, and Mobile were very beautiful this year. It was a really warm winter in North Florida, South Georgia, and South Alabama this camellia flowering season. In fact, Tallahassee growers did not even cover their greenhouses this season. Not covering the greenhouses meant that those huge gibbed retics did not bloom until late in the blooming season. We had some of the finest blooms I have ever seen in February.

Hope everyone will be careful and take care of themselves with this pandemic thing and I hope to see everyone in September at the ACCS convention. Plant Virus and Corona Virus

I got my first camellia plants in 1951. At that time being newly discharged from the Navy, I was looking for a profession and thought perhaps growing camellias would be my career. The filling in of a town ditch in Eutawville caused an unusually heavy rain to flood for a couple weeks my field of thousands of camellias from seed which I planned to use as understock, killed the plants, putting an end to that career (I lost the product of two-years work). The loss of my camellias caused me to use the G.I. Bill to attend college. Throughout my lifetime I have kept my interest in studying camellias and growing and

showing camellias. Those of you who were watching “Making It Grow” on television about 15± years ago saw me and my camellias over several years of occasional reruns. Alas! Most of that collection succumbed due to neglect. When the late Roland Allston (Clemson) came to my greenhouse to film, he first encountered beautiful green plants and remarked that “these looks like some of the healthiest plants I have ever seen.” After stepping farther into the greenhouse, he saw many camellias with cream colored mottled spots in leaves and made this remark: “you need to get rid of these plants because they have a plant virus.” I replied, that is a variegated flower variety and I look for good leaf variegation when I purchase certain variegated varieties. You see, most camellias with more than one color such as pink and white have a virus. We now have colors, mottled, moired, striped, etc. to use as understock to get new varieties of camellias. This is the same grafting principal used by fruit tree growers to get dwarf fruit trees. The understock is crucial to dwarfing trees as it is to induce a virus into a camellia scion.

When we do not want any virus in camellias, we must use no-virus root stock such as “Professor Sargent” and a no virus scion. When multiple grafting is done using both scions with and without viruses, care must be exercised in the tools used. Camellia growers have found that keeping their tools in a 1 part Clorox and 9 parts water will kill and prevent the viruses from being spread on contaminated tools. Just as hands spread coronavirus, tools used on plants spread plant viruses. I have always wondered how an otherwise beautiful show flower had a spot or two of virus—as judges are want to say: “just enough virus to ruin it.” (Perhaps unsterilized tools were used in grafting or the grafter forgot to wash his hands.)

Use plant virus spread as an example to follow the Trump guidelines for Coronavirus.

IF YOU FEEL SICK, stay at home. Do not go to work.

IF YOUR CHILDREN ARE SICK, keep them home. Contact your medical provider.

If someone in your household TESTED POSITIVE, keep the entire household at home

Work or study FROM HOME whenever possible.

AVOID SOCIAL GATHERINGS in groups of more than 10 people.

Avoid eating and drinking at bars or restaurants—USE PICKUP OR DELIVERY OPTIONS

AVOID DISCRETIONARY TRAVEL, such as shopping trips and social visits.

DO NOT VISIT nursing homes or retirement or long-term care facilities unless to provide critical assistance.

“You dig a hole, you put a seed in---you put dirt on top, add water, up comes the corn.”

Sage statement from DEMOCRAT President candidate, Michael Bloomberg

I imagined myself asking Mayor Michael Bloomberg a few questions: Mayor Bloomberg, what kind of soil in which you dug the hole to plant the corn seed? Why did Congress create Land-grant institutions during the latter half of the 19th century? America needed food: Agriculture provided a major part of GNP for the government and in several states such as South Carolina agriculture was the No. 1 industry. Why don't you just outright call all the Texas Aggies (derived from agri-culture) stupid. What about Clemson, Universities of Georgia, Florida and A&M Universities in every state? Have these Universities wasted over a century and a half teaching agriculture?

I'll just prefer my advice from something I learned over 80 years ago in grammar school. We were taught that Indians helped feed the Pilgrims by teaching them to put a fish in the holes in which they planted corn. The Indians might not have realized all the benefits of the fish, but they knew it helped their corn grow. Germination requires water, oxygen, light and heat. The fish attracted worms to provide tilth for the soil and enrich it more with their droppings improving soil properties for refreshing water and oxygen to seep down to the roots which in turn sent it up to the leaves and eventually corn ears. Soils are composed of about half mineral, third air and a twentieth organic matter and the remainder of a hundred percent, water.

I want to teach you a little about growing and harvesting. Get that? **GROWING AND HARVESTING!** The easiest part of growing corn is planting seed. You could put that grain between wet paper towels and sprout it but if your object is to get it to produce edible ears of corn, that's going to take time planning, preparing the soil, and much labor and obtaining knowledge of fertilizing, pests, best growing conditions, pH, weed control, and I could go on.

One other question Mayor Bloomberg, your fellow politicians are advocating doing away with farm animals such as cows, hogs, and other animals used for food. These politicians are also recommending that we do away with chemical fertilizers, etc. All stores are now putting in sections of organic vegetables. What I want to know Mayor Bloomberg is: How are you going to get enough trace elements and nutrients for organic gardening if it is not recycled through animal poop? Composted vegetable matter provides organic matter increasing porosity and makes the soil more ideal for plants, but the nitrogen phosphorous, potassium and trace elements are necessary for production of grains and fruit must go through living organisms.

Such naiveté shown by this Bloomberg statement must make way for true facts for people who want to be our leaders.
